ORDINARY TIME RESUMES ON MONDAY 1ST JUNE 2020AD

Cycle 2 resumes for Scripture Readings for Week Nine in Ordinary Time as Paschaltide is over.

PENTECOST EVENT

Pope Francis will be taking part, online, in a special Ecumenical Service on Pentecost Sunday with the Archbishop of Canterbury and Archbishop John Sentamu and other British non-Catholic Clergy. The Archbishop will be preaching at the Service and Pope Francis will make a special address. Archbishop Welby and Pope Francis have developed a warm relationship, often speaking to each other on the telephone, since taking up their respective offices.

This will be live streamed on YOUTUBE at 9.00 am on Pentecost Sunday and also available on the Church of England's social media channel.

KEEP IN PRAYER HONG KONG THIS PEN-TECOST

Whilst any violent demonstrations are to be deplored, it is obvious that many of the people of this former British Colony are concerned that the Chinese Government wishes to disregard the agreement reached when it came under Chinese rule, enjoying its own system of local, democratic Government for many years.

Lord Paten, the last Governor and a Catholic, alongside a large number of international commentators, has criticised the recent developments by China and its officials in Hong Kong. Our government has stated that it is considering granting the right to Hong Kong nationals to settle in Britain, and other countries are looking to repeal the special economic privileges granted by them to that area.

BEATITUDES (or Blessings) FOR A GLOBAL PANDEMIC

There follow the final Beatitudes provided by Gerry Penfold as an aid to silent prayer and reflection at this time:

Blessed are the hospital workers: the ambulance crews, the doctors, the nurses, the care assistants, and the cleaners, for they stand between us and the grave, and the Kingdom of Heaven is surely theirs.

Blessed are the church workers: the deacons, priests and bishops, for they are a comforting presence in a hurting world as they continue to signpost towards God.

Blessed are the single parents, for they are coping alone with their responsibilities and there is no respite.

Blessed are those who are alone, for they are children of God and with Him they will never be lonely.

Blessed are all during this time who have pure hearts: all who still hunger and thirst for justice: all who work for peace and who model mercy.

LOOKING TOWARDS THE RE-OPENING OF OUR CHURCHES

If our churches are to re-open, <u>The Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales</u> has made it clear that they can only do so if they comply with Government regulations. <u>Churches which cannot comply, as with other bodies, cannot open.</u>

Father Patrick needs to know as soon as possible the names of parishioners who will be available to ensure that social distancing is observed and regular disinfection of our churches is undertaken. They need to be available on a regular basis so long as the regulations are in force, both on weekdays and Sundays. It may not be possible to open both Churches at the same time if there is not a regular rota; our churches may have to open alternately, with parishioners from both communities working together.

The hope is that churches may be opened around 4th July, <u>if</u> they are able to observe the regulations, for private prayer. Depending upon the number of parishioners who can <u>regulative</u> commit, it may be possible to open for a couple of hours each day, with stewards in constant attendance and disinfection volunteers also attending.

Please let the Parish Office know if you are willing to commit on this, so that Father Patrick can ascertain within the next couple of weeks whether we can re-open and in what way this can be managed. This needs to be a <u>regular</u> commitment, possibly over several months. <u>If we cannot comply</u>, we cannot open.

In line with current guidelines, it is probably advisable that

those who are 70 or over should not be involved in the above, although some may feel that they could help with disinfection if satisfied with the precautions linked to it. Those over 70 with underlying serious conditions - *Asthma*, *Diabetes et al* - should definitely not take part nor probably attend a re-opened church at the present time.

Numbers allowed to enter a church will depend upon Government regulations and the space needed for social distancing, and Diocesan regulations will also need to be adhered to.

Always check that your emails are legitimate. Make sure you certify email addresses. Any official correspondence will be from the Diocesan address (name) @portsmouthdiocese.org.uk. If you are unsure, please be in touch with us to check before actioning anything from an unverified email address.

Don't be tricked by clever spam emails. Verify the address. Verify, if necessary with the person that you think has sent the email. Look to see if it has the @portsmouthdiocese.org.uk address.

Also be careful of PPE and hand sanitiser offers, Government or bank offers of COVID—19 'relief payments' and requests for charitable or NHS donations.
